Take the time to review the range rules before heading out to shoot so everyone is on the same page. Please understand that I and the other officers of the club realize that the vast majority of the membership are our biggest asset and have made our chapter a real success. We just need to be vigilant to not let the few who for whatever reason don't feel the rules apply to them or just don't care spoil what the rest of us have accomplished.

Chapter Happenings

By the looks of things I am predicting that we will have record numbers of new members before we get to the end of 2017. However, as things stand today the rate of folks renewing seems to be shrinking. We will not be sending out a third notice about the need to renew. Your only notice will be when you show up to shoot likely your gate card will have been turned off. This may be the only request you will receive and we wouldn't want you to miss 2017 trigger time.

If you have renewed and did so online, remember we suggest that you print off your own range card, but if your printer is down please give me a call or note and I will snail mail one out to you. I am happy to do it but it will be slower.

I can tell you that this will be a busy year however from the looks of the calendar and everything that has been scheduled. I guess that comes with success. And I hear that we may have some new venues outlined at the next board meeting. Stay tuned.

Legislative Activities

Things are humming at the capitol building since the Unicameral went into session. 667 bills were introduced in the first ten days and the hearings for each have commenced. Today I testified in behalf of Nebraska Ikes on LB 584 and LB 55. These bills deal with the mowing schedules of roadside ditches across Nebraska. When to mow is the question when considering that in parts of the state the major wildlife habitat is the county road ditch. So limiting mowing before the crop of pheasants have hatched seems crucial to sportsmen but not necessarily to those concerned with pool table cleanliness. We believe that some compromises such as no mowing until July 15 is in order and then focus on areas at intersections where visibility for safety is imperative.

Then, coming up on Feb 8th will be hearings on three bills which would serve to increase penalties for wildlife violations such as the senseless slaughter of those twenty some antelope out west earlier this year. One of the provisions would be that Nebraska would join the intrastate compact to treat a wildlife violation reciprocally with other states. Significantly license privileges revoked in a state would or could summarily be revoked across the country.

And of great interest to many of us LB 68 which preempts local jurisdictions from enacting and enforcing firearm laws that are stricter than State Law will have a hearing in the Government committee on Feb 10th. This bill does have 11 cosponsors so far including Lincoln senators Hilgers and Geist along with senator Ebke of Crete but you can be sure other urban senators will staunchly defend local control. Let your senator know how you feel. Our NSF and NFOA folks are standing tall but need everyone's help to get these jurisdictional issues fixed. This is a big deal for sportsmen of all persuasions because if you drove to Tekamah with a firearm in your car you likely violated several rules in several jurisdictions going across Lancaster, Sarpy and Douglas County.

Enough Ramblin'

Bur remember this; *"Dwight Eisenhower once said—I have one yardstick by which I test every major problem---and that yardstick is ; Is it good for America?"*

Funny how things like this that go around tend to come back around.

Vintage Military Rifle Match

Its winter now but in just eight weeks we will start another season for the VMR. This is a very safe, easy and fun way to shoot your old military rifles in a relaxed friendly competition. All you need is any rifle that was used by any military prior to the 1950's or there about. This includes WW II and Korean era rifles. Military surplus ammo is OK along with handloads and new manufacture. The rifles don't have to be in original condition. As long as the rifle started out as a military weapon but later was restocked or "sporterized" that's OK. There are four classes to shoot in. Original Sights, Target Sights for guns with modified open sights, Sniper for guns with added scopes (scopes don't have to be original) and 22 Trainer. The 22s can be original trainers used by many countries over the years or really any 22 one might like to shoot. Vintage era auto loaders like M1 Garand and Carbines are OK but remember all rounds are fired single loaded for safety reasons. No SKS, AK or Black Rifles.

The CMP Rimfire Sporter Match

After a one year absence, the CMP Rimfire Sporter Match is returning to Lincoln Ikes for 2017. Matches will be held on Range 2 the first Saturday of each month, April through October. Registration begins at 8AM and the match will begin at 8:30AM after a short safety briefing. The registration fee is \$10.

This is a great match for new shooters, those wanting to improve their three-position shooting skills, and anyone who enjoys friendly competition.

The course of fire is as follows. Ten rounds are fired at paper targets in each of six stages for a total of 60 rounds fired for record. The first two stages are fired in the prone position at 50 yards. The second two stages are fired in either the seated or kneeling position (at the shooter's choice) at 50 yards. The final two stages are fired while standing at 25 yards. In each of the three positions, both slow-fire and rapid-fire stages are fired. The slow-fire stage in each position involves shooting ten rounds in ten minutes. In the rapid-fire stage in each position, shooters fire two strings of five shots each. Semi-automatic rifles are allowed 25 seconds for each five round string; manually operated rifles are allowed an additional 5 seconds for each string.

By design, equipment required to shoot and be competitive is modest. As quoted from the 2017 edition of "CMP Gamed Rifle and Pistol Competition":

"The intent and spirit of CMP Rimfire Sporter rules is to provide smallbore rifle target competitions where competitors use low cost, readily available sporter-type, .22 caliber rimfire rifles. Any rifle configuration or item of equipment that is not mentioned in these rules or that is contrary to the intent and spirit of these rules is prohibited. The rifles and equipment permitted in Rimfire Sporter are strictly limited in order to prevent an "equipment race" from occurring in the Rimfire Sporter discipline."

This short list of equipment is all that is required:

- * Sporting style rifle (including tactical) chambered in .22 long rifle weighing not more than 7.5 pounds. Rifles with telescopic or receiver sights must be fired in the T-Class. Rifles with open sights must be fired in the O-Class.
- * A minimum of sixty rounds of .22 long rifle ammunition. At least ten additional rounds are recommended for sight.
- * Eye and ear protection.
- * A safety flag to be used as an empty chamber indicator.

The following equipment is recommended but not required:

- * A shooting mat.
- * A sling not to exceed 1.25 inches in width.

Another popular accessory is a spotting scope.

Although we have not asked the the CMP to sanction our matches this year, we will be following the complete rules that can be found on-line at <http://thecm.org/competitions/cmp-competitions-rulebooks/>

The course of fire is simple. Three ten minute relays each consisting of ten shots fired at 100 yards at a standard military bullseye target. First relay is standing off hand. Second is sitting. Third is prone or sitting. Highest score in each class wins. All shots are fired single loaded for safety reasons. No awards or pay outs. Just bragging rights. The range is open one hour prior to the match for sighting in so come early if you want to. All targets are provided and fee is ten bucks.

What you might want to bring along is a mat to lay or sit on while shooting and a spotting scope to mark your progress during the shoot. Shooting jackets and slings are allowed. Bring something to drink in hot months. This match starts at 8:00 am and is over usually by 11:00 am depending on how many shooters we get. Check the club calendar each month as the Saturday it falls on moves from month to month to accommodate other events.

Jan 7, 2017 – 300 Yard Benchrest by Mike Shapoval

The Benchrest match for this Saturday, January 7th, was cancelled due to the cold weather. The forecast was for a high of 22° and winds around 10 mph and gusts up to 18-20 mph. So Thursday afternoon I sent out an e-mail to the people the on my list that the match was cancelled. Checking back on the actual weather for that day, at 10 o'clock it was 12° with the wind a 10 mph. That made the wind chill a -3°. Those would not have been very good conditions to shoot in.

The cancellation made it the third time the first match of the year has been cancelled. We have cancelled the February match the last two years also. But the way the weather has had the temperature going up one week and down the next. Who knows were that cycle will be come February 4th?

Since we did finish the 2016-shooting year, our Top Gun awards were able to figured. As mentioned before we had not shot in the first two months of 2016. That meant a person had to shoot in at least five matches to qualify for a Top Gun award. The scores from those five months were used to figure the individual class awards. The three other awards are figured on persons total shooting scores.

The Shooter of the Year award goes to Don Westover. Don accumulated 43 points to win this award. The Two-Gun award goes to John Koppes, with a combined score average of 96.30. John is one of the two people that drive up from Kansas to shoot with us. The Custom Class award went to Mike Shapoval whose average score was 98.50. The Varmint Class award goes to John Koppes with an average score of 96.00 and the Hunter Class award to Don Westover who's score averaged 92.40. And the award for the person with the Most X's was Jeff Shultz. Who got 22 X's through the year.

Good shooting to all, and start reloading for the net monthly match Feb.4th.

Ramblings from the Trap Range – Dave Tunink

The past year was very busy on the trap range with the addition of another trap house, improvements on the shooting lanes, dirt work downrange, and the installation of new range lights. Most of these improvements were made possible from grant funds obtained by Dick Mavis. With the increase demand by members to use the practice traps we opened up an additional trap house. Nearly 5,000 practice rounds were shot by members in 2016. Based on counts off the machines there were 883,167 arm throws which would be an underestimate of the total targets throws since double targets count as only one, thus we were close to 900,000 targets thrown in 2016.

The upcoming trapshooting season has already started with Junior and Senior High practices occurring on nearly a daily basis until the first week of May. Please check the calendar for the practice times. There are several area schools using our range as their practice site those being Pius, SE, and SW along with their associated junior highs along with Pound Junior High. This accounts to several hundred youth trapshooters. Our range will again be the host site for Eastern Cornhusker Trapshooting Conference meets with the shoot dates being March 25-26, April 22-23 and April 29. We are always looking for Ikes members who are willing to help run these meets. Activities could involve scoring and loading targets along with just helping with maintenance around the area.

There will be both Summer and Fall trap leagues again with the Summer league organizational meeting scheduled for April 13th at 6:30 p.m. at the clubhouse. Team entry forms should be found on the Ikes website. One minor change from last year fees are that "all youth" teams will be required to pay half the cost of the team fee. An email will be sent out to team captains in our database the latter part of March or early April. The Summer League will start on May 11th and run through August 10th with a rain out make up on August 17th. The Fall League is scheduled to start on August 24th and end on Oct. 5th.

The Ikes range will again be the host site for the Youth Trapshooting event for the Cornhusker State Games with it to be held on July 23th with shooting starting at 7:30 a.m. Again help from members would be greatly appreciated as we have shooters from across the state competing.

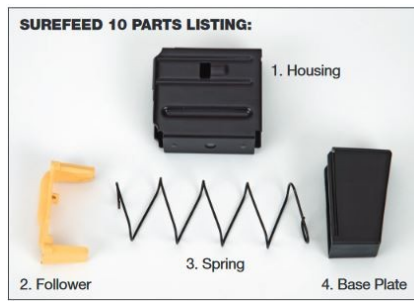
